Paralyzed vets ask Congress to meet needs

Support for caregivers. Improving veterans and survivor benefits. Reduce the wait times for receiving approved benefits. Maintain and improve the VA health care staffing and benefits.

These were just a few of the issues that Keystone Paralyzed Veterans discussed with members of Congress from Pennsylvania and their staff members who specialized in veterans and health care matters in early March in their offices on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C.

The visits followed PVA's annual two-day Advocacy/Legislation Seminar in Arlington, Virginia. President Mark Rosensteel, Legislative Director Chris Fidler, and MS Committee Representative Peter Townsend participated in seminars and other presentations that updated members of chapters from all over the United States on important legislation that will serve more veterans and serve them better.

Mark your calendars now!

Two major chapter member events have been confirmed for later in 2023.

The annual **Kennywood Park Picnic** will be held on **Wednesday**, **19 July**. The park will open at 10:30 a.m., and members who have passes for the day can arrive as early as they want. The picnic itself will be held at Pavilion 8 starting at 4 p.m., but members can use it as "home base" any time of the day. Food will be served there from 4 to 5 p.m., and door prizes will be awarded then. Kennywood has changed its policy on types of admission passes (there is only one category now, no matter what your age), and the amount of food ordered will be for the same number of people as receive group admission passes through the chapter, so a "picnic" charge will not be optional. On the other hand, the chapter will be obtaining admission passes at a substantial discount from what you would pay at the gate.

The **Annual Awards Banquet** has been confirmed for **Thursday, 05 October** at the Hampton Event Center on Route 8 in Richland Township, Allegheny County, a half mile north of the Butler Valley Interchange of the Pennsylvania Turnpike. No major changes in the format, except to ascertain the location and again, it will be in-person.

How to submit your requests for reimbursement

There are two categories of expense associated with this chapter. **Business expenses** relate to out-of-pocket expenses for travel to attend business meetings, organize chapter activities, or performing duties directly attached to serving on the chapter Board or as a chapter appointee (such as a VA Voluntary Services representative).

BUSINESS EXPENSES get reimbursed by using the chapter **Volunteer Expense Report**.

It can be sent to a member by email or postal mail.

Recreation expenses are incurred when a member buys a hunting or fishing license, participates in the chapter bass tournament or goes bowling, obtains a membership in a sportsmen's club or a fitness club, or participates in the National Veterans Wheelchair Games, the Buckeye Wheelchair Games, or other organized bowling, billiards, handcycling, fishing, or shooting events.

Be clear about what it is you wish reimbursement for. Mark the receipts by AT LEAST underlining the date, circling the amount, bracketing the payment method [cash or credit card] and briefly explaining the charge if it is not clear on the receipt—and it usually isn't. It helps to make these markings in red ink. Mail it to the office prior to the 7th of each month so there is time to prepare it for approval by the Board at its monthly meeting.

At this time, the chapter does not require advance requests for bowling fees, hunting or fishing licenses, or sportsmen's club or fitness club memberships. Use the Volunteer Expense Report to list the event(s) for which reimbursement is requested, and attach the receipts to it.

All other events require a minimum 45-day advance funding request using the **Application for Funding**.

It can be sent to you by email or postal mail. It has instructions on the back.

Handcycling

(The following report was submitted by David Gifford, pictured.) I attended the Paralyzed Veterans of America Sports Off Road handcycling event from April 13-16 at the Pocahontas State Park in Virginia. We rode off-road on several different trails requiring different technical skills to compete safely; my favorite trails there are the Blue Berry and Cork Screw Trails. These trails are tight in some places and fast in others over varying terrain and plenty of wildlife to be seen. It is great to get out in the woods.

This year we had bicycle maintenance support from two employees of the Lasher company, which makes handcycles. We also had three to six upright bicyclist and recumbent riders each day to ride with us. They help keep riders safe, sometimes guiding and sometimes following the different groups riding. Sometimes we need a little assistance to roll us back on to our wheels, help getting us moving on some of the steep hills or help in the event of bike mechanical problems. It is great to get together with veterans and talk about anything from biking to bladder care. This was also the first year we had a race to complete several trails on the designated course, which was fun and challenging.

I ride a Lasher ATH-FS, made in Las Vegas, Nevada. It is a bike designed specifically for mountain bike trails. It has power assist to get over almost any terrain and independent suspension to provide me with a comfortable safe ride on any trail.

Some upcoming events in Pittsburgh that include a handcycling division are the Pittsburgh Marathon on 07 May;



the Great Race on 22-23 September, and the EQT Pittsburgh 10 Miler on 06 November.


Whitetails for Warriors Hunt

(The following report was submitted by Tom Strang.) The hunt is held in October of each year at the Buckhaven Learning Center, located in Mount Gilead, Ohio, 41 miles northeast of Columbus, Ohio. Must be a combat wounded/disabled veteran with a service-connected injury or illness to be eligible for this hunt. Twelve veterans will be drawn by Buckhaven's hunt coordinator each year. If an applicant has applied and is not selected that year, the application goes back into the selection process for the following year. Applications will be accepted until July 31

The 2023 PVA Advocacy/Legislative Seminar and Congressional visits during the week of 27 February went off without a hitch for the Keystone PVA advocacy team. Chris Fidler, our legislative director, is always inspirational at his task. He keeps track of veterans' issues and the

bills they are legislating on behalf of all veterans. New to the team this year is Peter Townsend, who may be new but knows the issues. Peter is also our MS point of contact person for the chapter.

The process begins with monthly meetings via Zoom at which the national PVA government affairs and advocacy staff briefs chapters on the top issues facing veterans, their health care, and their other benefits. A little more than a month before PVA's annual 2023 PVA Advocacy/Legislative Seminar and Congressional visits, our chapter staff begins arranging meetings with all members of Congress from Pennsylvania (though not all respond favorably). Then we assemble a team of chapter representatives who can go to Arlington, Va. for the PVA seminar and then spend two more days making the scheduled Congressional visits on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C.

Most Congressional meetings were with staff people who specialize in veterans' issues, but in two cases--Representatives Chrissy Houlahan and Glenn "GT" Thompson--joined the meetings with us. All were

cordial and they paid attention to the details that we were explaining along with the current bills that are in play that need more sponsors. Basically, that is our job: to explain how critical it is to get more sponsors for the bills that are going to benefit our veterans and the disabled community.

Some people do not realize that what we do for veterans with spinal cord injury, MS and ALS, also benefit others in the community. Such is the case with the bill to improve the Air Carrier Access Act, the ACAA. if passed it will give disabled individuals who fly and receive damage to their wheelchairs or injury to themselves the ability to litigate and receive compensation for damages, a right which currently we do not have.

Another bill we advocated for passage is the Stop the Wait Act. This particular bill helps ALS veterans obtain critical benefits in a timely manner and not the current eight-year waiting interval. These are just a few of many bills that PVA is pushing for, and with our continued effort, hopefully they will pass soon.

Other items we addressed included VA staffing, infrastructure, facility-based long-term care, home and community-based services and caregiver supports, veterans and survivor benefits, transportation programs and supports, life insurance benefits, home modification grants, health care and benefits for women veterans, and assisted reproductive technologies-- and that's the short list.

PVA national has a team in the Government Affairs and Advocacy departments that works for us and they do a phenomenal job in preparing us for this daunting task of working for our own benefits.

But chapters, including ours, can do more to advance this legislation and these issues If more of our members will get Involved. If you would like to start out by joining us for the monthly Government Relations Zoom meetings with the PVA staff, let me or Chris Fidler know, or call the chapter office.

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Project Easter Bag grows to six veterans health care locations

Project Easter Bag has been a perennial veterans support project of the Keystone Paralyzed Veterans for decades, distributing personal use items such as liquid soap, deodorant, shaving cream and shampoo to hospitalized veterans around Easter time. Volunteer Coordinator Agnes Strang and a team of helpers obtained enough supplies for almost 500 veterans in two veterans' facilities near and in Pittsburgh, namely, the Heinz Campus of the VA Pittsburgh Healthcare System and the Southwestern Veterans Center operated by the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

During the "pandemic years," 2020 and 2021, the chapter did not conduct the project because access to the facilities was tightly restricted. But in 2022, chapter representatives approached the voluntary service offices of each facility and found they were willing to distribute the Easter Bags themselves. Our members also went to other VA medical centers and found them also willing to distribute the bags. All the chapter had to do was deliver them.

So in March and April 2023, chapter members obtained the supplies and arranged for assembly and distribution. The members in Erie and Lebanon obtained their own supplies, assembled and delivered them.

In Pittsburgh, even before the supplies were ordered, BNY Mellon reached out and offered the services of some volunteers to help the assembly of the bags at the chapter office. Because the office was to become the assembly point for Heinz and the Southwestern Veterans Center plus Altoona and Butler, the extra help was enthusiastically accepted! Pictured below, those volunteers were Shelby Coughenour, Zach Detemple, Sharon Garvey, Tracy Gregory, Heather Lafrenie, and Mark Luttinger.

The chapter has "site leaders" for members who get their care from four VA medical centers: Bill Lightner at Altoona; John Kellner at Butler; John Larese at Erie, and Chris Fidler at Lebanon. (Pittsburgh-area facilities continue to be served by Tom and Agnes Strang.) They made all necessary arrangements to get the personal use items to the hospitalized vets. The VA provides excellent care for hospitalized vets, but personal use items are the responsibility of the veterans themselves, or their families and friends.

Generous donors help defray the costs of the supplies, which cost thousands of dollars to obtain. We thank those who have helped make this project possible for many years, and who have now helped it expand.

Moss Rehab Institute for Brain Health (MRIBH) for TBI

MRIBH is a no-cost Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) treatment program supporting Veterans and First Responders across the U.S.

Veterans from all service branches and eras, no matter character of discharge or when TBI occurred, are eligible.

TBIs could have happened while on-duty or offduty in civilian capacity.

MRIBH will cover the cost of treatment, transportation, lodging, and meals.

MRIBH uses a multi-disciplinary team of clinicians (e.g., vestibular PT, OT, neuropsychology).

The program is designed to support patients in two phases:

- (a) initial 3-day evaluation to provide a snapshot assessment of patients' current health, and
- (b) follow-on 3-week Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) to treat and equip patients with tools/skills to retrain their brains, cognitive and mental health. Most importantly, we work with patients' existing

Keystone Chapter Health and Recreation Points System

To be eligible for chapter sponsorship to the National Veterans Wheelchair Games and other recreational programs, a member may earn points by participating in these activities. Sponsorship by the chapter requires 12 points per EACH event.

- Members are required to attend at least one Membership Meeting prior to attending a sponsored event.
- To receive credit for mileage, volunteer time & points, member MUST forward a Time Sheet—Volunteer Program Report (formerly titled the "Keystone PVA Volunteer Expense Voucher") and an After Action Report to the chapter office by the close of business on the 7th day of the following month. If the office is closed on the 7th, expense vouchers are due by the close of business the next working day.
- ◆All volunteers at the VA Medical Centers must complete volunteer training and receive a volunteer ID card. The volunteer hours MUST be in the name of PVA. Volunteer is responsible for forwarding the monthly VA Volunteer by Organization Report (VS26) to the chapter office by the end of the following month to receive travel expenses.

For more information on chapter programs, refer to Operations Manual Section 8, which you may request from the chapter office.

MEMBERSHIP PROGRAMS

- ► All receipts submitted for reimbursement must be dated within the Chapter's current fiscal year, 01 October—30 September.
- Keystone PVA will reimburse voting members for their annual resident hunting license, with a limit of one (1) Antlerless Deer License annually. Member must send a copy of all licenses and a receipt to obtain reimbursement. The cost of a resident fishing license will be reimbursed. Members may also be reimbursed for their membership dues for sports club memberships.
- Member Recreation Reimbursement Fund. Keystone PVA will reimburse voting members up to \$100 for attending any recreational event one time during the fiscal year or until the fund is depleted. Member must send receipts within 30 days of the event to the chapter office including a short description of the outing; good photos appreciated. This benefit is intended for members who do not take advantage of reimbursements and chapter payments for hunting and fishing licenses, or participation in recreational programs such as the National Veterans Wheelchair Games.
- Fitness club membership. The Chapter will reimburse members quarterly for memberships in nonprofit or for-profit organizations such as the YMCA, YWCA, Planet Fitness or LA Fitness up to \$10 monthly or \$30 quarterly.
- **▼** Weekly bowling league available to members as a recreational activity and to practice for the National Veterans Wheelchair Games (NVWG). Scores are in the newsletter and awards will be presented at the Chapter annual banquet.
- Reimbursement for hunting, shooting and fishing programs that Keystone PVA supports or sponsors.
- (Currently, this rule remains suspended.) Members that accumulate 12 points or more by attending membership meetings, attending Chapter functions, volunteering at VA medical centers, etc., qualify to participate in the Keystone PVA Sports and Recreation Program.
- ► All program expenses must be approved by the Keystone PVA Board of Directors.


